What do you know about the colonisation of Victoria and its impacts on First Peoples?

Discuss local culture, elders, talk about the environment and places of significance and why we need to better understand the lands we do walk on, how we can better respect and protect them.

In what ways do you think non-First Nations Victorians can contribute to the process of truth-telling and treaty?

By listening. And being led by First Nations Victorians on how we can best contribute and support them.

In what ways could First Peoples history and culture be promoted in Victoria?

At local events, in schools, in workplaces, at local parks, at places of significance, on public transport to these places, at local council, through local councils sharing and promoting local history that include First Peoples, not just the first mine that was built, or the local post office. Hire First Peoples first, in any position related to promoting history.
